





METHODOLOGY

- 500 interviews among 2020 voters were conducted from April 27-29, 2021.
- Interviews were conducted over the phone (both landline and cell phones).
- Results were weighted to ensure proportional response.
- The comparative margin of error for results is $\pm 4.4\%$ at the 95% confidence level. This number is higher for subgroups.



Q9. [IF BY MAIL] And have you voted by mail in previous elections or was this your first time voting by mail?

- Two-thirds of voters voted inperson with 38% voting on Election Day and 29% voting early. A third voted by mail.
- Men, voters in Providence county outside the city, middle aged voters, non-college voters, and Republicans were most likely to vote in person on Election Day while voters in Providence, older voters, and Democrats were most likely to vote by mail.
- Nearly two-thirds of voters who voted by mail said it was their first time doing so.








BREAKOUT: VOTING EXPERIENCE

- Overall, two in five 2020 Rhode Island voters say their experience was easier than in the past but a majority said it was about the same.
- Voters who voted by mail were most likely to say it was easier than before along with voters who voted early.
- Three-quarters of voters who voted in person on Election
 Day said it was the same as the past.

BREAKOUT: MAKING VOTING EASY

- Nearly two-thirds of voters think it is very important to make voting as easy as possible for Rhode Islanders and another 21% think it is somewhat important.
- Voters in Providence, CD 1, college educated voters, and Democrats are most likely to say it is very important
- Nearly three in ten Republicans do not think it is important.




Q17. In general, how important do you feel it is to make voting as easy as possible for Rhode Islanders?

Q11-15. I am now going to read a few policies that are being considered in the Rhode Island state legislature. Please tell me whether you support or oppose each one. [IF CHOICE] And would you say you strongly or somewhat support/oppose?

- A majority of likely Rhode Island voters strongly support establishing an in-person early voting period with men, voters in Providence, younger voters, college educated voters, and Democrats most likely to strongly support it.
- A third of voters also strongly support the other policies in the voting reform bill.
- Voters in Providence, younger voters, college-educated voters, and Democrats are most likely to strongly support each of the proposals.

- reform bill receives support from a majority of voters with in-person early voting the most popular followed by same day voter registration.
- A majority of voters support each of the proposals regardless of gender, area, or age with voters in Providence and younger voters most supportive.
- Over three in five college educated voters support each of the policies while support drops below 50% for non-college voters when it comes to no excuse absentee voting and establishing a permanent absentee voter list.
- Similarly, over three-quarters of Democrats support each of the policies tested while support among Non-Partisans drops slightly below 50% for no excuse absentee voting and establishing a permanent absentee voter list.
- Two in five Republicans support establishing an early voting period.



SIGNATURE MATCHING REQUIREMENTS





Q16. As you may know, if you want to vote by absentee ballot in Rhode Island you are required to either have your signature notarized or witnessed by two people. Due to the coronavirus pandemic, Rhode Islanders were allowed to vote absentee without doing either of those things. Instead, the state matched the voter signature on file to the application to confirm a voter's identity.

Based on what you know about this issue, would you support or oppose Rhode Island permanently confirming voters' identities by their signatures for absentee ballots? [IF CHOICE] And would you say you strongly or somewhat support/oppose?

- Three in five likely Rhode island voters support switching from notarization or witnesses to signature matching for absentee ballots.
- A majority of voters across demographic groups support permanently adopting signature matching, except among Republicans. However, over a quarter of Republicans support it.
- Support is highest among women, voters in Providence, voters under 65, and college educated voters.
